RECORDERS

By the end of January, students in grades 2-5 will be studying the recorder. Each student will be responsible for the maintenance, storage and care of the recorder, as well

as the cost for replacement if need be.



We will be following a recorder

program whereby the students will be playing and reading notes from the musical staff, identifying rhythms and experiencing folk songs, classical melodies, and popular music. The Ontario Curriculum will be addressed through the recorder study, and the students will be evaluated for a report card grade.

I believe strongly that each student will benefit greatly from this musical experience. You can help your child achieve success with the recorder in two ways:

- encourage your child to practice at home on a daily basis.
- ensure that your child can fully participate in class by bringing their instrument and music folder to school on the days they have music. Your support is greatly appreciated.

If your child is in grade 2, an order form will be sent home shortly to purchase a new recorder. If your older child has lost a recorder, this will be the opportunity to order a new one. Please be on the lookout for this order form coming home soon! Thank-you.

TIPS ON STAYING HEALTHY



 Flu season is here again. In Canada, flu season tends to run between October and April. The Ontario government is encouraging Ontarians to avoid getting sick this flu season by getting their annual flu shot.

Toronto Public Health is recommending that whenever students or staff experience flu-like symptoms, they head home and do not return to school until they are no longer infectious to others.

The primary concern is for the health and safety of all students and staff. Please note that no special measures are required when there is a case of influenza in a school or daycare. However, everyone should do their part to stop the spread of the flu. As parents, you can assist by: - reminding children to wash their hands often especially after using the washroom and before and after eating;

- reminding children to cover their sneeze and cough;

- watching for symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, dizziness, and/or high fever;

- informing the school if your child is ill;

- keeping your child at home when he/she is ill.

Schools do not have facilities to keep students indoors if they have not fully recovered, so please ensure your child is "back to normal" before allowing him/her to return to school.

still occur from time to time!)

Just a reminder that you need to call **416-395-2727 before 9:00 a.m.** to ensure your message is received and the information entered. If you miss that cut-off time, you will receive an automated phone call. Should you receive a phone call, BE SURE TO STAY ON THE LINE UNTIL THE END OF THE MESSAGE TO SELECT A REASON CODE. If you do not choose a reason, the system will keep calling back until you do! Thanks for helping us to keep your children safe!

SCHOOL COUNCIL NEWS

It was a busy Fall for the School Council. Pizza lunches, sub lunches and QSP kicked off the year with great success. Thank you to all the leads and a whole host of volunteers. The Council has completed one fundraiser and the second wrapped up with Festive Decor arriving for pick up on December 4th. Our first event of the New Year will be an evening for the whole family with OOZAKAZOO on January 22nd in the gym. We are happy to say we were able to fund several important items for the school this year thanks to the successful fundraising efforts of last year. We have provided funds for 4 projectors to enable teachers to display computer based learning for the whole class. We provided funds for the purchase of iPads for the 4 kindergarten classrooms (a requirement for each full day kinder class, but not funded by TDSB) and we also purchased an Apple TV for use in the portable to enable the students to pursue technological learning right in their classroom. As well, and as per every year, the council has also provided funds for several Arts events that the school arranges for the students each year. Hopefully our fundraising efforts will be as fruitful this year, allowing the school to continue to purchase items on their wish/need list and to plan events for next year.

The Council applied and was successful at securing a *Parents Reaching Out* grant from the district this year. It is a \$1000 grant intended to be used to further parenting skills. We have partnered with Rippleton Public School and are using the grant to secure the dynamic parenting expert **Dr. Karyn Gordon**. She will be presenting *"Raising Healthy Kids in an age of Overindulgence"* on Tuesday, February 10th at Windfields Junior High School. We have already sent out one e-mail notification about this date – watch for more information closer to the event.

FEBRUARY IS KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION MONTH

At the TDSB, we know early learners learn best through doing; so our four and five year olds are introduced to math and science through play as part of K-12 STEM



programming. To inspire a love for learning, kindergarten classrooms are bustling with inquiry and exploration through science activities, math games, art projects and more.

If you live in our catchment area and your child will turn 4 years old by December 31st, 2015, we encourage you to visit the school on or after February 12th to pick up a Junior Kindergarten registration package. We also welcome Senior Kindergarten students who have not yet registered in another local TDSB school. To attend Senior Kindergarten, your child must turn 5 years old by December 31, 2015.

We will be offering Full Day Kindergarten in September 2015, as well as Before & After School care. To register your child for JK or SK, a parent or guardian must visit the school during one of the following registration times:

> **Thursday, February 19th** 9:15 – 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 – 4:30 p.m.

Friday, February 20th

8:00 a.m. – 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 – 3:30 p.m.

The following documents must be provided for registration:

- All paperwork provided in registration package
- Proof of address; 2 copies of identification with your address and name eg. purchase/lease agreement, tax bill, utility bill (not telephone bill or driver's license)
- Immunization record booklet
- Proof of citizenship
- Health card
- Family Doctor's full name, address and telephone #
- Proof of sole custody (if applicable)

We will hold a Kindergarten Orientation on Wednesday, June 3rd at 4:15 p.m. for students and their parents.

Note: If your child was not born in Canada, verification of date of arrival is required. Families who are permanent residents and refugee claimants may register directly at the school. All other families should visit the International Program and Admissions Office, Toronto District School Board (TDSB), 5050 Yonge Street, for a TDSB School Admission Letter. Children without immigration status are welcome in our schools and information about them or their families shall not be shared with immigration authorities, as per TDSB Policy P.061SCH.

LIBRARY NEWS FROM MS. INNOCENTE

The Learning Resource Centre (a.k.a Library) has been abuzz with activity over the past few months. Aside from the usual book talks and book borrowing, our students have engaged in media literacy, research and computer technology activities.

Our kindergarten friends are learning valuable skills as they visit the library lab every week to interact with literacy and mathematics websites (eg. *BookFlix, ABCya* and *LearningPlanet.com*).

The grade one students in Ms. Frangos' class are studying various media forms and recently learned to use an online database called *PebbleGo* to research their science topics. Ms. Lussier's class is examining the features of non-fiction texts and other media forms. They used an online posting wall called *Padlet* to post inquiry questions and respond to open-ended class questions. They also explored an online drawing program called *Pixie* and created slides for their "What I Am" iMovie.

As well as studying media and non-fiction texts, Mrs. Mirabrahimi's grade two class is also learning to use *Pixie* as they draw illustrations to accompany their digital fables.

Ms. Higgins' and Ms. Panela's students studied the features of a book review and created their own reviews which they either posted online to the TDSB "Just Read It" site, or published as a colour poster for our library bulletin board. They are presently learning the finer points of an online comic strip program called *Bitstrips* in order to create curriculum related comic strips.

Ms. Lam's grade four students have delved deeper into media literacy by analysing the purpose, audience and production of certain media forms. They looked at various commercials to infer overt and implied messages in advertising. They are presently deconstructing newspapers in order to understand their form and function.

The grade five students in Mr. Whittington's class started the year by learning to use features of Microsoft Word (eg. SmartART) to create graphic organizers in order to track their inquiry-based learning. They moved on to work in groups to create an iMovie for our Remembrance Day Ceremony. They were entrusted with the task of searching for images of troops that they thought might evoke an emotional response from their audience. They then had to sequence the images in a purposeful way and explain their reasoning. After adding appropriate music, they had to instruct the app to pan across the photos in order to create a sense of movement. They soared to the challenge and created an iMovie that brought tears to the eyes of almost everyone who attended the event. Kudos to them!

I am excited to announce that our students took part in an international education event during Computer Science Education Week, December 8-14, 2014. The event was called Hour of Code, with the goal of giving students across the US and Canada their first taste of computer programming. All of our students, from youngest to oldest, engaged in one hour of computer programming. We are hoping that this experience sparked in our students an interest in creating the technology of the future - not just consuming it! RECESS DURING COLD WEATHER

Elementary school students are kept indoors for recess and lunch times for a number of weather conditions such



as rain, lightning in the area, extreme winds and extreme cold. When temperature and wind chill measure -28C or lower, students are kept indoors. Recesses and lunch hour may be shortened if the temperature and wind chill reading is between -28C and -20C.

If a student's medical condition requires further consideration due to weather conditions, or if parents have other questions or concerns about how and when weather conditions affect your child's school day, please contact the school office.
